NOTATIONS FROM APPLICATIONS

I arrived at TSN on 12-21-68 after serving at RAF Wethersfield, England. I was assigned to the 1876 Comm. Sq. as a teletype operator. My assignment was for 12 months. However, there was an AF regulation in place that stated "No more than 36 consecutive months overseas unless war has been declared." After questioning my chain of command and receiving no help, I wrote Congressman Bob Casey who started a Congressional Investigation. The outcome provided me with 2 options: (1) Return to the U. S. immediately for reassignment. (2) Volunteer to serve in Vietnam until July 10, 1969 and return to the U. S. for an early Honorable Discharge to return to school. After signing the Volunteer statement, I gave the Commander the names of 3 friends (Don Ackersn, Aaron Harvey, John Hagan) who were also eligible to

return on 7-10-69. I returned home to complete my education (BS; Med; PhD) and recently retired from Teacher Retirement Systems in Texas with 42 years credit. 5 years elementary teacher; 3 years High School Assistant Principal; 30 Years Elementary Principal; 4 years military credit. My 38 years were with Deer Park Independent School District. I look forward to connecting with others who served at TSN.

A PREFACE TO THE NEXT PAGE (From an email to the Editor, from Peter Beyette)

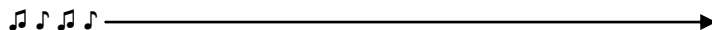
Good Afternoon Larry,

I have attached a song that I wrote many years ago, 1978.

I served with Detachment 5, 6922nd Security Wing from 1966 through 1968. (For those who may not know, Air Force Security Service was a separate wing like SAC, TAC etc with headquarters at Kelly "on the hill," AFB San Antonio, under the National Security Agency. I believe that it is now Electronic Security Service. When I was discharged I signed papers saying I would not discuss our mission which I have saved with other memorabilia).

In 1978 I was on a business trip to Erie, PA not far from my home near Buffalo, New York. Having no plans for the evening, I decided to see a movie. I chose "The New Centurions" starring Burt Lancaster as I recall. I did not know prior to viewing the movie that it was about the early days of US involvement in Viet Nam. Following the movie I returned to my motel room and went to bed. Some where around 3:30 in the morning I woke up went to the desk in the room and wrote the song which I titled "Ten Years After." I did not think about it, I just wrote it in about an hour at which time I went to sleep. It seems significant that, as I recall, years later, in the early eighties there were reports of Viet Nam Vets having problems which were referred to as "ten years after syndrome." I don't know whether anyone else recalls that. I don't think that I made it up. We all have a story, this is mine. Not one day passes that I do not think about the experience and all of those who were lost. This is dedicated to all who served.

REUNION SPEAKER

On Friday evening, October 12, our banquet speaker will be Colonel Chuck DeBellevue.

1970s-1980s -- Chuck DeBellevue was the first U.S. Air Force weapons systems officer to become an ace during the Vietnam War in 1972. DeBellevue became America's top "MiG Killer" when he and his pilot, Capt. John Madden, downed two MiGs, giving him six in total, the most earned during the Vietnam War.

In October 1971, he was sent to the 555th TFS at Udorn Royal Thai Air Base. As a WSO with the "Triple Nickel," DeBellevue scored his first four aerial victories while crewed with Capt. Steve Ritchie, who became the first USAF Vietnam War ace. DeBellevue became the second when he downed two MiGs on Sept. 9, 1972 while flying with Madden on a four-ship combat air patrol.

During his combat tour, DeBellevue logged 550 combat hours while flying 220 combat missions. His skill as a WSO was recognized when he and the other two U.S. Air Force aces, Ritchie and Capt. Jeff Feinstein, received the 1972 Mackay Trophy, the Veterans of Foreign Wars' Armed Forces Award and the Eugene M. Zuckert Achievement Award.

DeBellevue retired from active duty as commander of the Air Force ROTC Detachment 440, University of Missouri-Columbia, Columbia Mo., in January 1998, after 30 years of military service.

He retired with numerous awards, including the Air Force Cross, the Silver Star with two oak leaf clusters, the Legion of Merit and the Distinguished Flying Cross with five oak leaf clusters, among others.

Tan Son Nhut Memorial Project Update

We are pleased to announce Johnnie Jernigan has signed a contract with Dodd Monuments beginning the process of casting the two bronze plaques for inclusion within the Tan Son Nhut Memorial. This is a major step forward as we now have all the memorial project's construction components under contract. As the construction phase moves forward, the Memorial Committee will continue to post pictures and related articles in Revetments.

Included in this project update are some photos giving visual looks at the progress being made. The large base of the bench has been finished and it already looks impressive even without the seat slab. Please note the circular hole in the center of the base. In the August 2011 special edition of Revetments, the Memorial Committee said provisions would be made to embed a small amount of soil from Tan Son Nhut as a special tribute binding the air base itself and the black bench together. The soil will be inserted into the hole seen at the top center of the base. The soil will be inserted into the hole seen at the top center of the base. The Memorial Committee already has a small amount of soil and if you would like to contribute any Tan Son Nhut soil you may have, please do so by sending it to Johnnie Jernigan. His address is 956 Donham Drive, Beavercreek, OH 45434. Should the association's members contribute more soil than the bench's capacity, the soil received will be blended together before filling the hole. Any soil not inserted into the bench will be spread over ground just before the concrete slab base is poured.

The Memorial Committee is now beginning to plan for the dedication ceremony itself. We have not gotten very far into the planning process but we do know there are museum guidelines to be followed since the memorial is located on an Air Force Base. The dedication ceremony will be as meaningful and memorable as the committee can make it.

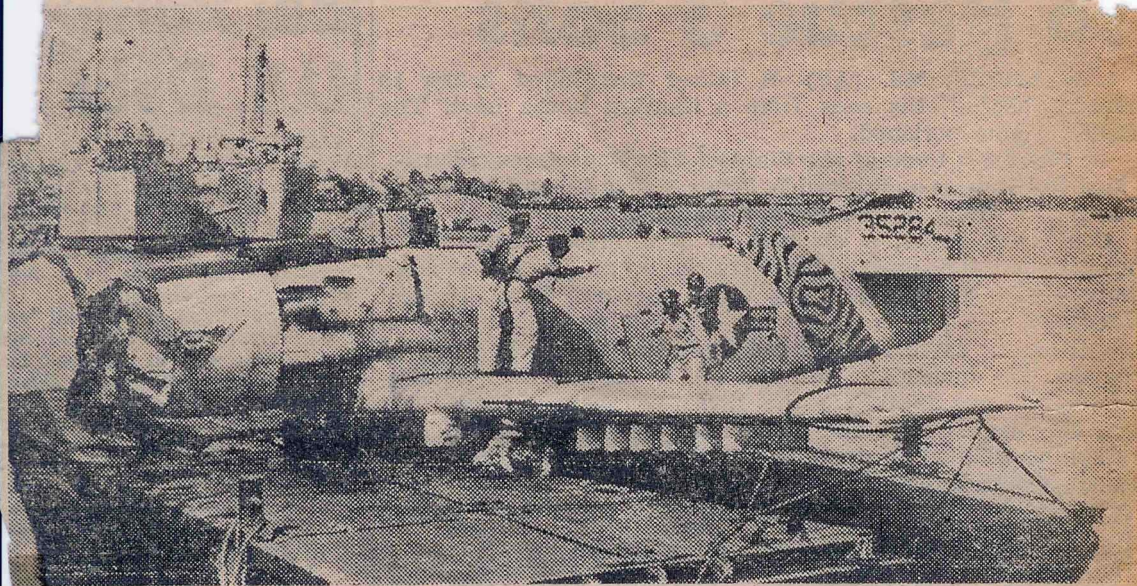

Aftermath of Palace Bombing



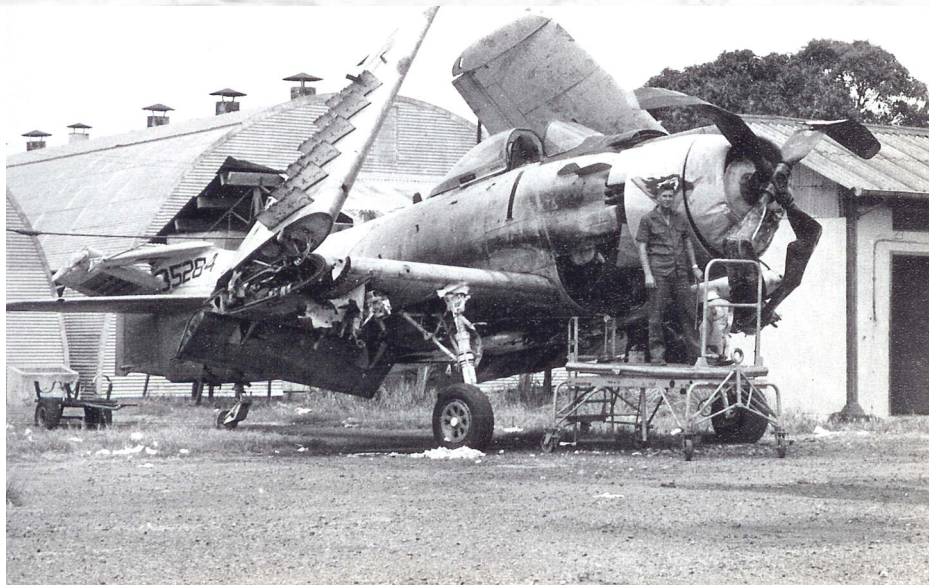
