Dear Revetments:

I was almost moved to tears by your plea for printed nourishment in the October 2012 edition. I felt bad because I'd been reading you for four years without responding.

Actually, as Willie Nelson put it, "you were always on my mind", especially each time that I returned to Viet Nam via Tan Son Nhut and saw your namesake revetments still standing on the flight line, sentinels of memories long past. Although timeworn and somewhat overgrown with weeds after almost a half-century of neglect, they still stand, a tribute to quality engineering and workmanship.

I have seen them there many times as my airplane passed by in 1967, 1968, 1972, 1991, 1993, 2001, 2005 and 2009. I hope to see them still proudly standing guard as I pass in review again in November, American Airline pilots union permitting. Each time I see them I recall being under their protection while working on aircraft parked inside, sheltered from the fierce tropical sun, torrential monsoon rains, and random enemy rockets.

I am enclosing a photo of me and my

wife, Thuy, riding an elephant in Buon Me Thuot during our last visit in 2009. I'm the one under the TSNA cap. Thuy also has an interesting connection to Saigon and Tan Son Nhut. She was born there during the 1968 Tet Offensive around the time that I was hunkered down a few hundred vards from the base chapel on the night that it was hit by a VC rocket. Thuy and I met 37 years later in the Mekong Delta city of Long Xuyen where we both worked at An Giang University, she as an English/Vietnamese translator and teacher and I as a lecturer teaching Business and English to undergradu-

Well, I hope that this light snack will curb your hunger somewhat. Now that I am retired, I'll have more time to drop a line or two as I work on my memoir...you've been warned!

C hortly after New Year of 1968 I was shipped to Mactan, in the Philippines. I was an aircraft mechanic on C-130's. They gave me a job in Maintenance Control and my boss said, "Don't bother to unpack because I am sending you to Tan Son Nhut." So off I went for a year of "fun" all through the Tet offensive, etc. lived in the 800 area and worked on "Rebel" ramp and "Charlie" ramp. I remember coming under sniper fire on the way back to the cantonment, after swing shift one night, and nearly getting myself blown away. And I remember our C-130 getting hit on the Flight Line, and being shot down up north. Quite an experience. I will never forget it.

TSgt. Lynn E. Bullard Det. 1, 834th Airlift Division Jan 68—Dec 68 I spent my tour with the 45th Tac Recon Sq. working on the RF-101 Voodoo along with Sgt. Bill Graham, Sgt. James Brennan and TSgt. Whippler.

John F. Burns 460th FMS-45th TRS Polka-Dots Sep 68—Sep 69

ssigned HQ 1964th Communications Group USAF. Bunked in 1876th Comm. Squadron under 1876's First Sgt. for housing. TDY to Phan Rang AB. Rocketed first night in and noon one other day. While under rocket fire at noon or thereabout, HQ CMSgt. called and HQ. had a good laugh while we were hunkered down. 1964th knew instantly when AB under attack because of Comms. Otherwise traveled to Bien Hoa, Cam Phan and an Army PBR Base (Cat Lai?). Loved to take Huey's anywhere we could on standby.

Frederick C. Brooks 1964th Communications Group Jul 69—Jul 70

was assigned to the 834th Air Division Det. 1. The 834th AD Det. 1 had approximately 50 members. We were the support group for C-130's TDY from Tachikawa AFB, Japan, and Naha AFB, Okinawa. We had at least 50 C-130's on the ground at all times. The C-130's supported the forces throughout Vietnam around the clock 7 days a week. I worked evening shift to turn around the C-130's for their next mission, working 12 hour shifts.

Division in Tay Ninh Province from October 2, 1969 to October 12, 1970. Since 2010 I have served as the National Vice President and Historian of the 8th Cavalry Regiment Association.

Last summer I helped Lou Reda Productions produce the documentary series "Vietnam in HD" for the History Channel. I assisted them with research, and with gathering and viewing personal film collections from other Vietnam veterans. Currently, Lou Reda Productions is beginning work on another Vietnam program and I am again helping them gather home movie film collections to use in it.

There are so many things to do in Chattanooga! After a day of exploring Rock City and taking in the view on the Incline Railway, join the crew aboard the Southern Belle Riverboat for a relaxing dinner cruise along the Tennessee River. These are just some of the best **Chattanooga attractions**.

The **Southern Belle Riverboat** is one of the favorite attractions. The Southern Belle offers daytime sightseeing cruises and daily lunch cruises along the Tennessee River. The nightly <u>dinner cruise</u> is famed for its prime rib. Specialty musical performances accompany most dinner cruises and are wonderful for the whole family. Reservations must be made by May 22, 2013 to ensure room availability.


The supply of handicapped accessible rooms is limited.



Tan Son Nhut Association Life Member Chairs Committee to Build a Veterans Memorial

James Stewart, O.D. served as a sentry dog handler with the 377 Security Police Squadron form Sept. 1967 to Sept. 1968. Over the past 20 years he has compiled a database of 1,300 men who served in the 377 SPS during the war. He is currently the chairman of a committee to erect a veterans memorial building in Montrose, MI. He states, "This is not a local memorial. We will include any U.S. military veteran from anywhere in the U.S. from any service period."

Charlie Emmendorfer, a Michigan welder/artist, has created a six-foot tall stainless steel bell to honor his father-in-law who was a prisoner of war during the Korean War. He is donating this sculpture, valued at 80 to 100 thousand dollars, to be the centerpiece of the memorial. The building to house the bell is the current fund raising project for the Veterans Bell Memorial committee. Stewart says, "Our volunteers are making the memorial's post and beam main structure from ash trees that have been killed by the emerald ash borer. We plan to begin construction on our octagon-shaped building in the summer of 2013."





JANUARY 31, 1968



(Written above with "the pass" is this text:)

At approximately 03:20 on the morning of January 31st, 1968, 2700 Vietcong and North Vietnamese Army regulars of one regiment of the 9th VC division, elements of the 271st, 269th, and 267th Main Regiments , the 2nd Independent Battalion, and D-16 Battalion attacked the western end of the Tan Son Nhut Air Base just outside of Saigon, Vietnam. The 1968 Tet Offensive was on. The plan was to gain access to the Air Base through a little used gate on the western side of the main runway called Gate 051. Colonel Nam Truyen, who was the Commander of the 9th VC Regiment, planned the attack. Phony gate passes, such as the one displayed above, may have been used to allow sappers to get close enough to the gate to toss explosives. PFC Gary F. Monahan of the 110th Transportation Unit, United States Army, retrieved this particular specimen from the body of one of those Viet Cong attackers. PFC Monahan was part of the Task Force 35 Detail, under the command of the 377th Air Force Security Police Squadron QRT (Quick Response Team) assigned to defend the western end of the runway.

(From Gary's email with the above):

At around 9:00 AM on the morning of the TET offensive our unit had made it as far as the small cemetery just across the road from the infamous Textile shop and were taking fire from that textile building...the building was pummeled by US Gun ships and mortar fire which allowed us to pull

back from that area...on the way back toward the turning point at the west end of the runway there were several dead VC and this card was right next to one of them so I picked it up and put it in my pocket...Afterward, I wrote a letter to my Mom and put the card inside...in 1992 My Mom passed and my Stepdad found the letter and the bogus pass and gave it back to me...I framed it and it hangs on my wall in my office...It always amazed me at how simple it was to make and that it appeared to be typewritten on a U.S. typewriter...I have been questioned in the past about it's authenticity but I can assure you it came right off the battlefield that day...
