I had just loaded my fuel tanker at the fuel farm when the mortar hit the storage tank. Took truck and trailer of 5000 gallons, to area where if hit no harm would come to planes or personnel.

Chuck Impey 377th Supply Oct 65 - Nov 66

was there when we helped Bien Hoa build the airstrip. The major problems were car bombs and restaurant explosions. I lived in the first makeshift barracks with mosquito netting on base, and with a lady of the night off base. I was a young 20 year old lad with a fiancée who wrote me a dear John because I was supposed to get married after 2 years in Japan and volunteered for Nam instead.

On Saturday, September 24, we will be having a Dedication of the 2016 Tan Son Nhut Association Memorial Bench at the U. S. Veteran's Memorial Museum.

The U.S. Veterans Memorial Museum - where every day is Veterans Day.

Located in Huntsville Alabama, this is one of the premier military museums in the country. The exhibits of memorabilia, artifacts, and military equipment range from the American Revolutionary War to present day. Included in the collection are many rare and important artifacts including the oldest surviving jeep: the **Ford Pygmy**



The Pygmy was hand built in the Ford development shop in Dearborn, Michigan using parts from Ford's commercial and agricultural lines. It pioneered such design features as the flat grill with headlamps positioned behind it for protection, an intermediate bow for the canvas top, the fuel tank mounted inside the body under the driver's seat, and a twopiece opening/folding windshield. The headlamps were also positioned on a hinged bracket which allowed them to be pivoted to illuminate the engine compartment at night.

All of these features were incorporated into the standard WWII jeep, the Willys MB. The pilot vehicles were the property of the manufacturers and after testing was complete, the Army returned them. Though neither the Bantam nor the Willys pilot vehicles are known to have survived, the Pygmy is preserved in virtually original condition as acquired from The Henry Ford Museum in the 1980's. Fortunately, the second Ford pilot was discovered in 1998 derelict in a field in California. It has been restored, and is currently held in a private collection in The United Kingdom. The only known surviving Bantam BRC-60, serial number 1007, with date of delivery "11 29 40" stamped on its data plate was delivered to the Army six days after the Pygmy arrived at Camp Holabird for testing.

While the large and truly impressive vehicle display is astonishing, the most remarkable sight is nestled in between them.

The museum hosts the most complete collection of Jeeps in the world! This collection, laid out in chronological order, starts with the oldest Jeep in the world, Ford's pilot model #1, handcrafted by Ford engineers and technicians over the course of 30 days in 1940.

They fed us and gave us spiritual food. It was a "<u>Home Away From Home</u>". We were able to sleep over night and enjoy home cooked meals with a home like atmosphere. IT WAS GREAT!!!

VIETNAM VETERANS DAY

FRIENDSVILLE, MD MARCH 29, 2016

On March 29, Vietnam Veterans Day, I had the privilege to address a group in Friendsville, MD during a remembrance service for the Friendsville 6. During the Vietnam War, this small town in Garrett County MD lost six of their Sons between 1967 and 1971. The remembrance service was held in the front circle of the Elementary School, where the monument to them was erected. The remembrance service was arranged by the DAR - Youghiogheny Glades Chapter, NSDAR, Garrett County, Maryland.

I was very thankful that it was a sunny day, but it could have been a little warmer. There was a decent size crowd of about 70 adults, most of them representing the various Veteran Service Organizations. As the program was about to begin, all the students came out and joined us in the service. The students led us in the Pledge of Allegiance and sang a song that honored the veteran. And they did an excellent job.

It was somewhat of a typical gathering with the standard guests, Federal, State and Local politicians with some community figures, with all their proclamations. They were read and fortunately their words were few. At least they maintained their focus on the family members of the Friendsville 6 attending and honoring the Vietnam Veteran. It was the first attempt of the DAR to host such an event. They did a wonderful job. It was well organized and they were well prepared. I was proud to be a part of this event.

On a personal note, in preparing for my speech I looked up the six on the Virtual Wall in an attempt to learn more about them. Naturally, I emphasized my search on the two USAF members. While reading some personal messages left for Norman, one was from the air craft commander, Louis Hari, of the C-130 where Norman was KIA from a rocket strike. The email address on that message was 9 years old but I took a chance and sent him an email. I heard from him the following day. He informed me Norman was KIA at Qua Lot where they had landed from Cam Ran Bay. He also told me that he was initially assigned to Cam Ran Bay. His unit was later reassigned to Tan Son Naut. I did tell him about our organization and invited him to join.

One part of the remembrance was very touching. When each name of the six was read, the bell on top of the monument would toll and a family member or friend of the six would place a rose on the monument. When they read the name of Norman Thomas, there were no members of his family or any friends were present. The Mayor of Friendsville, Spencer Schlosnagel, quickly looked at me and whispered will you take care of this. I was honored.

Concerning Thomas Fike, I found this on the personal notes from http://thewall_usa.com/guest.asp?recid=16112.

Sgt. Tom Fike was KIA in December 71. It was his last mission before rotating home (it was to be a milk run out of Saigon and back). His crew was shot down as they were returning to Saigon. The pilot thought that they had seen a rocket launcher set up in a rice paddy. They went in low level to check it out (flying a UH□1N slick), and they received heavy ground fire. Sgt Tom Fike, a door gunner was killed, the other door gunner was seriously wounded and at least one other crew member. He was one of the last members of the Green Hornet Squadron killed in Vietnam.

When I came away from the remembrance, I was both Honored and Humbled. Honored that I could participate and Humbled by the true sincerity of the Welcome Home from the non-veterans. That is why I love small town America.

Here is the speech I gave:

"I would like to thank the DAR Youghiogheny Glades Chapter for making this remembrance possible.

Also, the Mayor of Friendsville and members of the Town Council for their support.

And to the Veterans Service Organizations and to all who took time out of their day to attend.

While preparing for today I found a wonderful quote from PRESIDENT RONALD REAGAN.

It was part of his last Veterans Day Speech in 1988.

"Those who live today remember those who do not. Those who know freedom remember today those who gave up life for freedom."

And today, part of this remembrance, involves 6 young men that all had ties to this town. They are: DANNY EUGENE NICKLOW, ROSS FRANCIS FIKE, CHARLES WAYNE HOOK, NORMAN EUGENE THOMAS, ROG-ER LYNN GARLICK, THOMAS EUGENE FIKE.

Many of you knew them or their families. Some of us were serving in country at the time of their deaths.

If we do not know their faces, we will always honor their service!! In many cases, there is no stronger bond than that of the brotherhood and sisterhood of veterans. Many times, stronger than family bonds.

It is VERY evident in the Bond of the Vietnam Veteran. And why not!!! Too many folks have chosen to believe the myths, that are constantly being propagated, even today, than actually try to learn the truth. It also doesn't help that, in society today, there are only about 10 % of the families that have a direct connection to a veteran, either a father, Mother, Sister or Brother.

In the case of the Vietnam Veteran, I am certain that the percentage is much lower.

As I have said, too many people chose to believe what they were told about us, and not take the time to learn the truth. Our service was honorable, and it is something we all should be very proud of.

And it is up to us, to get that truth out to the public.

Although it was a long time coming, I am pleased that this country has finally recognized our service.

But the fight is not over!!! We still have a long way to go. The scars from Vietnam or any war, whether visible or invisible, will always need to be addressed.

As we stood on the shoulders of those who served before, so does the Modern warrior stand on our shoulders.

What we do in our fight for ourselves, will also assist those who have served after us.

That is why I have a very high regard for the founding principle of the Vietnam Veterans of America; "Never again will one generation of veterans abandon another."

Every veteran has paid the price, our debt to them, is always due.

GOD BLESS you, GOD BLESS all who serve and have served, and GOD BLESS AMERICA!

FLAG RAISERS ON IWO JIMA

Being in the Military is a Great Heritage as many Veteran's articles in "The Revetments" have attested to.

One of my goals was to visit the graves of the Six Flag Raisers on Iwo Jima.

That I accomplished two years ago. An Honor and a Privilege to know the stories of these men. Three of these men were killed just weeks after the Flag Raising: Harlon Block, Michael Strank and Frank Sousley.

Michael Strank, Ira Hayes and Rene Gagnon are buried in Arlington National Cemetery. Frank Sousley is buried in Elizaville in northeast Kentucky. Harlon Block is buried in Harlingen in southern Texas. John Bradley, the Medic, is buried in Antigo, Wisconsin. John passed away in 1994, the last of the six.

Note: There are two of the "Flag Raising Memorials". The first one was built in Harlingen, Texas. That was used as a 'Model' for the one at Arlington.
