HONOR FLIGHT - APRIL 2, 2016

This was the first ever Honor Flight that honored both the World War II vets and their escorts.

Because this was the first time that all the escorts were Vietnam vets.

There were 77 WWII vets and 77 Vietnam vets on flight 1941.

Normally, the escorts were family members or friends of the WWII vet - and the escort pays his or her own way.

This time, though, Honor Flight wanted to do something different and honor both groups of veterans.

I heard about the special flight early in March, through a Vietnam veteran friend of mine. At that time they still needed a few Vietnam veterans, "Elite Escorts", for the flight.

I got in touch with Honor Flight and they sent me the paperwork. I completed it and sent it back in. I was interviewed, accepted, and told to attend a special training class they have for all escorts, on how to take care of their charges.

I was then given his name and contact information. I got together with him at his home and we got acquainted before the trip. He is a very nice 92 year old Navy veteran who seemed to have more energy than I did.

On the day of the flight I picked up my charge at 4:00 AM, at his home and drove him to Miami International Airport, arriving at 4:30 AM. I dropped him off at the Terminal and parked my van. I joined him in the Terminal, where we processed in, along with all the others. Everything went smoothly and was handled very professionally.

We finally left at 7:00 AM. While taxiing out to the runway our plane was given a "Water Cannon" salute by a local fire department, an Honor usually reserved for "Heads of State". We all felt honored and appreciated it very much.

Along with key Honor Flight personnel were a team of photographers, a medical team and also a group of NBC News media, to videotape the trip.

We arrived in Washington, D.C. around 9:00 AM. Immediately upon departing the plane, every WWII vet was placed in a special wheel chair which was then pushed around by his escort, for the remainder of the trip.

Upon entering the Terminal we were greeted by hundreds of well wishers, of all ages, military and civilians. It was a touching scene and very much appreciated by all the veterans.

We were directed to our special buses outside by young Army troops who had volunteered to stay and help us for the entire day.

Our first stop was Arlington Cemetery, where we all witnessed the "Changing of the Guard" ceremony. We, and especially the WWII vets, were acknowledged there and everywhere we went by a grateful public.

A far cry from what a lot of Vietnam Veterans received upon our return.

Everywhere our buses went we had a police escort.

After Arlington we boarded our buses and were whisked off to the "Knights of Columbus" for a great sit-down lunch, served by our young Army volunteers.

After lunch we all boarded the buses and were escorted to the "World War II Memorial". Most of the old vets hadn't been there before and were very taken with it. It was a very emotional time for them. The public was great there and very engaging. All the WWII vets were lined up, in their wheelchairs and a panoramic picture was taken of them. The whole experience was very inspiring.

After the taking of many photos we were loaded back on our buses, then driven over to the “Vietnam Veterans Memorial Wall”. More pictures, much emotion and engaging public.

Then back to the airport where we saw more well wishers shaking our hands and patting us on the back. All of the vets were visibly affected by the public support.

Our plane finally left Washington D. C. at 7 PM. Something extra they did for this special flight was “Mail Call”, where everyone, WWII & Vietnam vets received a package of notes, letters, and drawings from people honoring them for their service and showing their appreciation. It was a complete surprise and very touching.

We arrived in Miami at 9:00 P.M. and received another “Water Cannon” salute. We were one hour late and all very tired.

We departed the plane, and the WWII vets were put in their wheelchairs, for the last time that day. We wheeled them up the ramp and into the Terminal.

It was unbelievable the crowd that was waiting for us there. I’m sure it numbered a thousand people. Servicemen and women, schools, civilians of all ages, even a drum and piper band. It was unbelievable and very emotional.

My WWII vet told me “I’m not an emotional guy, but I have tears in my eyes.” I actually felt the same way. It was something I will always remember—people taking pictures, veterans taking pictures of the crowd, people applauding, waving little flags, the band playing.

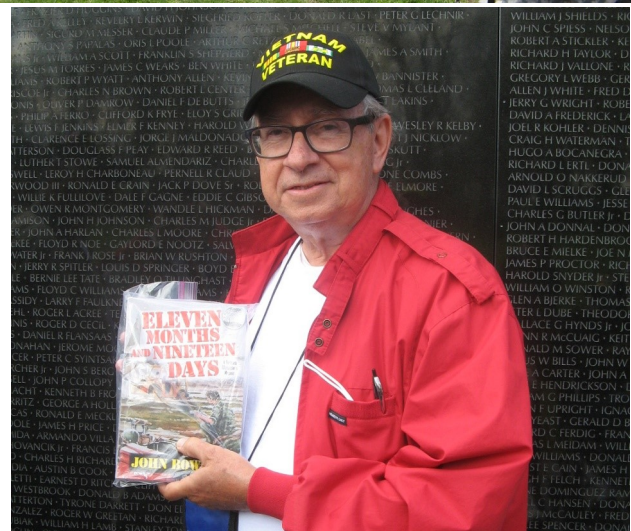
It must have taken us one hour to get through the Terminal. When we did get outside I left my vet there, in his chair, to get my van.

I finally got him back to his home at 11:00 PM. I got back home at 11:30 PM.

I was spent both physically and emotionally, but very happy and inspired.

I feel very honored to have been a part of that particular “Honor Flight” - a part of history. I will never forget it or my part in it.

I am still in close touch with my WWII buddy and plan to keep seeing him.

(Veterans Resource Fair)**

Friday May 27th, the VA, along with 42 vendors, held a Veterans Resource Fair at the Elks Lodge in Hartford City, Indiana.

I was able to touch base with Veterans with Diabetes and guide them in the right directions for help.

I also met with Congresswoman Susan Brooks, pictured with me holding my Continuous Glucose Monitor). I was first in VA to get a CGM and it has saved my life a few times. Congressman Brooks is leading the charge on getting Medicare to pay for these to help save lives for those who suffer from diabetes.

Since my Pancreas has quit, this has been a truly life saving device. I came home from Vietnam in 1968 and developed diabetes at that time, which was from Agent Orange. So as my diabetes has worsened over the years and body parts shutting down the VA Doctors put me on the CGM. Now with the CGM and using Glucagon in my Pump, I am able to stay alive.

So the Veterans Resource Fair was twofold for me. As I was promoting my Vietnam Veterans With Diabetes, I also was passing out TSNA cards and Applications.

September is fast approaching for our reunion. Do you have your registration in yet?

We are going to have a nice Reunion in Huntsville. There is a lot to see and do.
