HUNTSVILLE, AL SPACE PROGRAM

When Dr. Wernher von Braun arrived in 1950 in the tiny Alabama town which called itself the "Watercress Capital of the World," Huntsville boasted a population of 15,000. Today, it is forged forever in history as the place where America's space program was born; where the rockets were developed that put the first U.S. satellite into orbit and sent men to the moon; where the power for today's space shuttle was developed; where the modules for the International Space Station were designed and built; and where America's next great ship – the Space Launch System – is being designed.

During the final months that von Braun and his team of scientists were refining the giant rocket that sent Apollo astronauts to the moon, he was also preparing to launch another important project: a permanent exhibit to showcase the hardware of the space program. Von Braun was director of NASA's Marshall Space Flight Center (MSFC) in Huntsville when he approached the Alabama Legislature with the idea of creating a museum jointly with the U.S. Army Missile Command and NASA. After Alabama lawmakers and its citizens voted in 1968 to finance construction, the U.S. Army donated land on its Redstone Arsenal, which is also the site of the sprawling NASA center, and the U.S. Space & Rocket Center® was born.

Since opening its doors in 1970, nearly 16 million people have toured the Center. The vast majority of those visitors have been from out of state or from foreign nations. Many of the more than 600,000 annual visitors are school students on field trips to their future. Dozens of interactive exhibits encourage visitor participation, prompting one official to note: "Here, everyone can be an astronaut for the day!" Home to [Space Camp®](#), [Aviation Challenge® Camp](#), and [Robotics Camp](#) the U.S. Space & Rocket Center (USSRC) is the largest spaceflight museum in the world. Its large rocket and space hardware collection is valued in the tens of millions of dollars. From America's first satellite, Explorer I, to next generation space vehicles like Sierra Nevada's *Dream Chaser*, the museum showcases the past, present and future of human spaceflight. The U.S. Space & Rocket Center serves as the Official [NASA Visitor Center](#) for [Marshall Space Flight Center](#) and is an [affiliate of the Smithsonian Institution](#).

I left Blytheville AFB. AR on Jan 4, 1967 to Vietnam. I attended Camp Bullis for training in San Antonio, TX.

I arrived in Vietnam on March 15, 1967. Assigned to Phu Cat AFB; after 1 month reassigned to Tan Son Nhut in Saigon. I was assigned to Security and later assigned to 7th AF (HQ) Honor Guard and pulled entry point guard indoors and outside the compound. Our barracks (new) were near the flight line and the new BX. I pulled security and bunker duty during my time on the strike team squad. I can't remember the sector I pulled, but it was near the village on the base on Tan Son Nhut and was assigned to the Main Gate during Tet '68 and later put back to Honor Guard at 7th AF (HQ) Honor Guard. My supervisor at 7th AF (HQ) Honor Guard was Malvin C. Anderson, SSgt., USAF 377th Security Police Sq. My NCOIC, Law Enforcement Operations Section was Sgt. Patrick Bowden. My Law Enforcement Operations Officer was Frederick J. Reder, Capt., USAF 377th Security Police Sq. My Squad Leader was A1C or Sgt Roger Neal.

After Vietnam I went to Holloman AFB in Alamogordo, NM. I entered the U. S. Army National Guard of New Mexico after 2 years NM Air National Guard in Albuquerque, NM. I have qualified in the U. S. Army National Guard as a squad leader on the Chaparral Air Defense, Avenger, Stinger Missile Operator, Personnel and U. S. Army (Ft. Bliss) School in El Paso, TX as a Truck Driver (Heavy).

My education is BA in Physical Ed. Health (Minor); other minors are Special Education, Secondary Education, Drivers Training Instructor, and Nutrition.

Masters Degrees are in Physical Education (K-12), Special Education (K-12) specializing in Learning Disabilities and Guidance & Counseling and Agency (K-12) and retired from teaching after 25 years while coaching football, basketball, and track at the Jr. High level. I also was activated in December 2001/January 2002 and was assigned to Cannon AFB for 1 year (The NM Army National Guard took over Security on the Base in Clovis, NM. We all had to qualify as Security Force personnel while being stationed there. Retired from the NM Army in September 2005, and retired from teaching in May 2006.

God Bless America and the U. S. Air Force Security Forces forever. Retired as a SFC (Army), MSgt. (USAF).

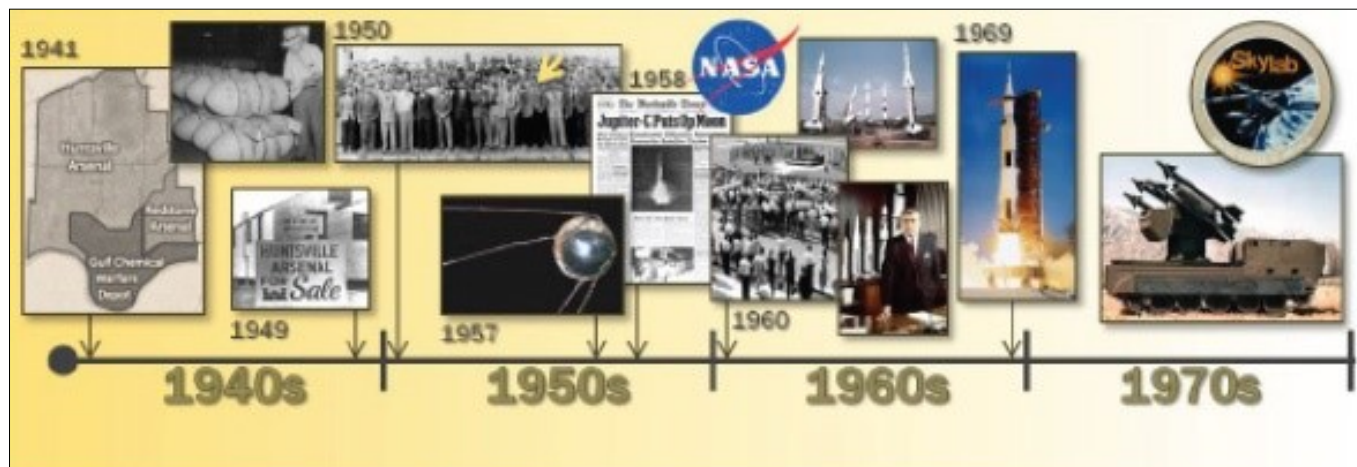

EDITOR'S NOTE: Below on this page, and at the beginning of the next page is a history of Redstone Arsenal, in Huntsville, AL, where a good number of us will be gathering in September for the TSNA Reunion.

Pre-Arsenal Settlements:

The middle Tennessee River valley, now occupied by Redstone Arsenal, was originally inhabited by various American Indian tribes including the Creek, Cherokee and Chickasaw. By the early 1800's, Anglo-American farmers had established farming communities along this region of the Tennessee River basin. Over 550 families, mostly tenants and sharecroppers, lived in small farming communities on this land. Ultimately, the U.S. War Department purchased the farm land to build what is now known as Redstone Arsenal.

1940s:

Today's Redstone Arsenal was originally formed as three separate entities in 1941 and 1942 as part of the War Department's ramp-up for WWII. Huntsville Arsenal manufactured chemicals, Redstone Ordnance Plant (later Redstone Arsenal) manufactured munitions, and the Huntsville Chemical Warfare Depot (later Gulf Chemical Warfare Depot) stored the conventional and chemical filled munitions before being shipped out.

Once WWII ended, the focus shifted from production to the demilitarization and salvaging of munitions along with the deactivation of the huge manufacturing facilities at the arsenal complex. Some of the empty buildings were even leased to private enterprise. By 1949, part of the arsenal was advertised for sale by the Army Corps of Engineers. The sale never happened due to the Army's decision to consolidate its rocket and guided missile missions here in 1948 and 49.

1950s:

With the arrival of Dr. Wernher von Braun and his rocket team from Fort Bliss in 1950, the arsenal became the center of Army missilery and rocketry. During this decade, Redstone's scientists, engineers, and technicians transformed numerous weapon systems such as the REDSTONE, JUPITER, HAWK, PERSHING, NIKE AJAX, and NIKE HERCULES from dreams into realities. It was also during this time that the von Braun team made several notable contributions to the nation's space effort while working for the Army. Most notable was the Army's launching of America's first satellite, EXPLORER I, into space in January of 1958. This and other achievements by the Army helped lay the foundation for U.S. space exploration.

1960s:

In support of the newly formed NASA, a large number of Army employees, land and facilities supporting space and rocket programs were transferred to NASA and the Marshall Space Flight Center (MSFC) was established. Army work continued to focus on developing and sustaining ground and air defense missile systems with a focus on the Cold-War and maintaining a technological edge over Soviet systems. Meanwhile, MSFC was focusing on the ultimate space prize of putting a man on the moon. Rocket motor test stands roared as MSFC worked around the clock to achieve manned space flight. The Saturn-V rocket that eventually carried our three astronauts to the moon in 1969 was ultimately the result of the work performed here.

1970s & 1980s:

Although the United States had won the Space Race, the Cold-War continued on. Redstone Arsenal activities continued to develop advanced weapon systems and train service members on the maintenance and repair. A few of these systems included the PERSHING-II, CHAPERRAL, Multiple Launch Rocket System (MLRS), PATRIOT, and AVENGER.

After retiring the Apollo space missions, MSFC continued to focus on propulsion systems, space station operations, and numerous other programs. These included the Skylab space station, Space Shuttle development for routine space access, and Spacelab 1.

In 1988, a term that would later become part of the common local vocabulary, was first introduced as the Base Realignment and Closure (BRAC). The 1988 BRAC round realigned the Test, Measurement and Diagnostics Equipment (TMDE) Center from Lexington, Kentucky and sparked a new era of growth only rivaled by the expansion seen previously with NASA's space programs.

1990s:

The Space Shuttle program throughout the nineties served as NASA's workhorse. Its many flights included the delivery of the Hubble Space Telescope which was another program developed at MSFC.

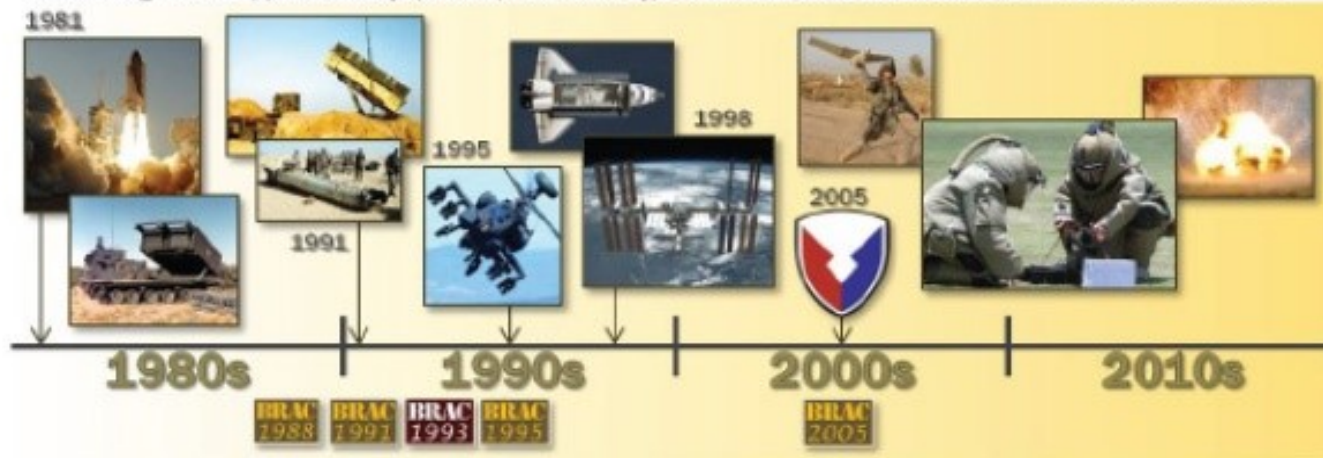
BRAC 1991 brought materiel and logistics readiness activities from Lexington, Kentucky, and the Presidio of San Francisco, California, which merged and later became AMC's Logistics Support Activity (LOGSA). Additionally,

the Armament, Munitions and Materiel Command (AMCCOM) was to relocate to Redstone, but this decision was reversed in the 1993 BRAC round. Another BRAC round was released in 1995 which realigned Multiple Army aviation activities and commands from St. Louis, Missouri, and merged them with Redstone Arsenal's Missile Command and other missile related centers.

2000s:

The synergies created by bringing aviation to Redstone Arsenal resulted in tremendous growth on the installation and in the local community as the results of the largest BRAC round to date were released. BRAC 2005 brought the Army Materiel Command's four-star headquarters, Space and Missile Defense Command's 3-star headquarters, the majority of DoD's Missile Defense Agency, and U.S. Army Security Assistance Command's 2-star headquarters from Northern Virginia. The Aviation Technical Test Center moved from Fort Rucker, Alabama and merged with the Redstone Technical Test Center to become Redstone Test Center. 2nd Recruiting Brigade and 2nd Medical Recruiting Battalion were also realigned to Redstone from Fort Gillem, Georgia.

Other significant growth has occurred due to decisions outside of the BRAC process as well. The newly activated Army Contracting Command and Expeditionary Contracting Command, realignment of Department of Justice's explosives research and analytical centers for the FBI and ATF, and various new programs within existing organizations have not only brought growth. They have added to the already diverse and dynamic mission set, only found at Redstone Arsenal, Alabama.

David Carney served in the U.S. Army 1963 to 1970 as a nuclear weapons technician. During that time he was stationed in Germany, Italy, and Fort Sill, Oklahoma.

Much later he joined to the National Guard as a Public Affairs Specialist with a deployment to Hungary and Bosnia and shorter tours at the Pentagon, Japan, Thailand, and Joint Base McCord, Washington.

In 2003 he was ordered to active duty by his brigade commander to "take care of the Soldiers and their families" during the deployment of the entire brigade which was located in 19 cities across Alabama. He quickly learned that what really mattered to both Soldiers and families was the welfare of the families, especially their children.

So he created many programs across the state such as interactive video tele-conferencing between families and Soldiers in Iraq, three radio shows interactive with both Soldiers and families, a weekend shopping trip to an outlet mall near the beach in Alabama, and many programs across the state. He created departure and return ceremonies for every unit in all nineteen cities.

His awards include mayor's keys to five Alabama cities and the Distinguished Service Medal of Alabama (the highest award the state offers.) He has been recognized by proclamation many times by both the state legislature and governor.

A virtual orphan, he was raised by grandparents, uncles, and aunts until he started looking for a "real" home. He quit school in the 10th grade to join the Army at age 17. Later he graduated Athens State University with highest honors and then earned a Masters in Business Administration from University of Alabama - Huntsville. He taught economics, accounting, and marketing at Faulkner University. He is also a retired banker.

He speaks frequently to various groups on attitude and service to others.

He is known for his upbeat attitude and outlook on life.
