Let's Celebrate Together For The 50th Year of the USAF! Sign Up Now For The Hampton Reunion October 8th-12th

Just a quick note to remind everyone that the reunion in Hampton, VA is just around the corner(or at least six months around the corner). It's time to get organized and put in your reservations for room, meals, and tours. Tours that are currently on the schedule include:

Colonial Williamsburg Overview Yorktown Battlefield site

The cost for this combined tour which lasts 7 hours, is \$30.00 per person. This includes a morning in Colonial Williamsburg with a guided tour through the past and events that helped shape America's history. There will be shopping, browsing, and the merchant's square is a great place to have lunch. Followed by a scenic ride on the Colonial Parkway to the village of Yorktown. You will visit the National Park Service Visitors Center and view the exhibits relating to the historic Battle of Yorktown, and a 12 minute film. Also a rooftop view of the battlefields. This tour is scheduled for Thursday morning on October 9th. We must have a minimum of 30 people to have a bus tour, which is designed for minimal walking.

We also have scheduled a tour of the Langley Air Force Base. This is the oldest operating Air Force Base in the USA. This tour will include a through the windshield tour by bus, a static display, and a hanger tour of an F-15. Followed by a lunch at the Officers Club with the base commander. The tour starts at 10:30 am with lunch at 12:00 pm.

The Holiday Inn, Hampton Hotel and Conference Center will be the host of our reunion this year. Special rates have been given to the T.S.N.A. for the reunion at \$69 a room for up to 4 people per room. Upgrades to the Executive Level is only and additional \$10.00. in 1971. Upon graduation from basic training at LackLand Air Force Base, TX. I was assigned to the 821 Security Police Squadron, Ellsworth six months of humping B-52 bombers and Minuteman Missles. I decided to volunteer for Vietnam. When I received my order for Vietnam, my assignment for the 377th Combat Security Police Squadron, Tan Son Nhut Air Force Base.

Excerpt from the novel AIR WAR: VIETNAM by Frank Harvey

TAN SON NHUT

Tan Son Nhut Airfield in Saigon is a steaming cauldron in which the ingredients of war are mixed and stirred and blended in preparation for a multitude of missions in support of the Vietnam war. The field is dominated by a single 10,000-foot strip, and during the morning and evening rush hours it is close to a madhouse. Tan Son Nhut is the busiest airfield in the world-busier than Kennedy, busier than O'Hare.

Everything is designed to clear the planes off the runway in a few seconds. Spaced along the main strip are three feeder strips angled into the runway. Sixty planes are sometimes waiting in these three lines, engines running. Often two planes take off together-either in formation or in tandem, one after the other. As one lifts off, it turns sharply to make way for the one behind it. Takeoffs and landings are often taking place simultaneously. The FAA wouldn't like it, but it sure gets planes up and down in a hurry.

Pipers, Cessnas, Beeches, DC-3's, Caribous, Grumman HU-16's and other smaller aircraft lineup at the 5,000 foot tumoff while C-54's, C-118's, Connies and the like wait their turn at the 7,500 foot mark. Heavy fighters-F-100's, F-102's, F-104's, F-4's, F-5's and lumbering jet transports such as Lockheed C-141 lock their brakes and spool up to takeoff power down at the far end.

A light plane may land long and wheel off quickly around the banked racetrack curve at the end of runway while a jet comes in hot behind-landing short and popping its chute at the beginning of the strip. A C-130 full of

ammo turns on short final and squeezes in front of Pan Am 707 on a long, straight-in approach.

Emergencies occur almost hourly. A squadron of choppers, down to their reserve fuel, flail toward the field. An RF-101 Voodoo touches down gingerly on battle damaged landing gear. A B-57 limps in all shot up, and they lift out the wounded pilot after he shuts it down and rush him to surgery.

A Kaman HH-43 helicopter lugging a large red fire bottle on a cable under its belly stands by constantly for just such emergencies. As the wounded ship comes on final and touches down, the chopper flies alongside ready to douse any blaze instantly. Crash trucks and a mobile derrick are always at the ready too. If a crash occurs, the trucks race out, spray foam on the damaged plane and the mobile derrick muscles it off the runway. With the wild stackup that's usually overhead the field can't afford to close down even for a few minutes.

Tan Son Nhut is the most active American air base in Southeast Asia. Around the field are rows of ramps and concrete parking areas where planes are outfitted for every conceivable kind of mission. In addition to being a marshaling yard for the goods our cargo planes bring in from overseas, Tan Son Nhut is an operational base for search and rescue, defoliation, in-country supply redistribution, air defense fighters, helicopter salvage work, bombing missions, day and night reconnaissance, VIP air taxis spotters, Medevac, Troop Transportand a host of other activities.

You see here a greater variety of aircraft than has ever been assembled on a military field. It's a regular air show to watch them come and go. To visit Tan Son Nhut, to wander about the field and see the number and variety of its aircraft, and the multiplicity of missions they are engaged in, is to have brought home to you the absolutely central role of air power in the American involvement in Southeast Asia.
