TAN SON NHUT AIR BASE—EARLY 1962

The paragraphs below starting with "asterisks" are from a publication I found titled "Vietnam Air Losses" by Chris Hobson.

The other two paragraphs are from the original "onionskin" carbon copy of the TSN Air Base Chapel notes that I typed, obviously as you can see, on a manual typewriter with no eraser handy.

**2 February, 1962

C-123B 56-4370 Special Aerial Spray Flight, attached to 464 TCW, USAF, Tan Son Nhut. Captain Fergus Coleman Groves, KIA; Captain Robert Darrel Larson, KIA; SSgt Milo Bruce Coghill, KIA.

The first U. S. Aircraft lost in South Vietnam was a C-123 Provider of the Ranch Hand Defoliation unit. The aircraft was on a training flight when it crashed into dense forest during a practice spray run in an inaccessible area near Route 15 between Bien Hoa and Vung Tau killing all on board. The Viet Cong were thought to have removed items of equipment from the wreckage before a search party could be flown into the area. As the wreckage was largely destroyed by a post-impact fire it was not possible to find evidence of sabotage or engine failure or hits from ground fire. However, after the crash all Ranch Hand aircraft were escorted by fighters during their spray missions.

2 February 1962. Chaplain Kilpatrick was busy all morning with C123 plane crash. He visits various units within the Ranch Hand organization and made arrangements for a Memorial Service to be held at 100 hours, 3 February. Airman Fry went to Bien Hoa as a guard, then cleaned the Chapel and helped out in the Mail room.

3 February 1962. The Break Hanger was turned into the Chapel for the Memorial Service, which was held at 100 hours. Attendance was about 300, including BG Anthis, and Ambassador Nolting, and many VNAF Officers and men. Airman Fry cleaned the Chapel and made things ready for Sunday Services.

**11 February 1962

In the early phase of American involvement the U. S. military was supposed to be in South Vietnam on an advisory or training basis. Consequently each aircraft had to have a Vietnamese on board, ostensibly for training but often merely to "legalise" the operation. This was especially true with regard to aircraft like the B-26, which the US had no intention of providing to the South Vietnamese. Nevertheless, the USAF did train thousands of VNAF air and ground crew over the next 10 years and valuable combat experience was gained during these early operations. An SC-47 was on an early morning leaflet dropping sortie along the main route from Saigon to Da Nang when it crashed in the mountains near Bao Loc with the loss of all on board. It was unconfirmed whether the crash was due to enemy action or an accidental cause. This aircraft had been based at RAF Bovington in England in 1961.

12 February 1962. Chaplain Kilpatrick had to cancel trip to Nha Trang due to emergency (plane crash). Chaplain Kilpatrick prepared letters to Chs Davy, Radtke, Richards and Venters. Airman Fry typed same and sent them out. Chaplain Kilpatrick kept abreast of news of plane crash and met helicopter when bodies were returned to Det 8. Airman Fry had 2nd ADVON CQ from 1630 - 0730, 12-13 Feb.

13 February 1962. Chaplain Kilpatrick, Airman Fry, and Sgt Ortiz, went to Bien Hoa (Det 9) by truck. Met with Det 9 Commander and made arrangements for a Memorial Service to be held at 1830 hours 13 Feb, then returned to Tan Son Nhut. Chaplain Kilpatrick and Airman Fry met the Bien Hoa Courier Run (C-47) at the Terminal at 1515 hours, and returned to Bien Hoa with it. Visited the men there and made final arrangements for Memorial Service. Service began at 1847 hours due to late arrival of VIP's. VIP's in attendance were: General Harkins, General McGarr, General Timmes, General Weede, General Anthis, and General Le Van Ty, Chief of the VN Armed Forces, Mr. Nolting, U.S. Ambassador to Viet Nam, Mr. Ansbacher, Chief of USIS, Col Turcott, Col Ritchie, Col Osborn, Lt Col Beebe, Maj Bentz, Maj Klus, Lt Col Aquila, Maj Bartlett, Maj Fahy, Capt Perry, Capt Richardson. Chaplain Kilpatrick and Airman Fry returned to Saigon in VIP airplane.

14 February 1962. Chaplain Kilpatrick wrote a rough draft of his Memorial Service address. Airman Fry obtained the names of the VIP's in attendance and also names of the deceased personnel, and typed up the address.

MORE ON RED HORSE

Hello my brothers from another mother. I was assigned to 1st Civil Engineering Group (Heavy Repair), activated on May 8, 1967 and headquartered at Tan Son Nhut. The unit distinguished itself over the next three years by earning seven campaign streamers including one for the 1969 TET counter-offensive. 1st CEG command section included the commander and his deputy serving as a staff element of the 7th Air Force Directorate of Civil Engineering. The group was authorized 17 officers and 58 enlisted personnel. The Engineering Division standardized the facilities designed and constructed by RED HORSE, reviewed project designs accomplished by the squadrons, and established a master file of all designs for construction in the Vietnam theater. In addition, it issued construction directives for projects assigned to RED HORSE with the AF Regional Civil Engineer for Vietnam. This helped insure proper design and siting of RED HORSE projects, and to formulate specifications and project requirements by reviewing and evaluating contractor proposals for various projects requiring procurement of pre-engineered structures. The Operations/Plans Division analyzed squadron capabilities, monitored construction schedules and priorities, and coordinated operations with 7th Air Force. In addition, it maintained liaison with Military Assistance Command, Directorate of Construction (Army) and Officer in Charge of Construction (Navy) agencies in country. The division also had cells that monitored Prime BEEF teams and well-drilling operations in country.

The Materiel Division identified sources of supply and procurement, and expedited supply actions when necessary. It maintained a consolidated list of squadron equipment resources, assisted critical equipment parts and repair actions, and controlled and directed redistribution of equipment assets in light of the overall RED HORSE mission. I served from 22 June 1968 – 26 June 1969 with 1st CEG as a SSGT (Logistics Specialist). I coordinated time sensitive acquisition and delivery of heavy equipment/construction material to RED HORSE Squadrons, provided logistics support and inventory management for heavy construction equipment and materials to assure assets were available for Red Horse Squadrons. My duties included TDY on multiple military transport (C123 Provider/C124 Old Shaky/C130 Hercules/C7 Caribou) to the 554th Phan Rang, 555th Cam Ranh Bay, 819th Phu Cat, 820th Tuy Hoa, 823d Bien Hoa. I drove military and civilian vehicles to accomplish mission critical tasks at Vung Ro Bay Port, RMK-BRJ Construction Depot Saigon Vietnam, Binh Thuy Navy Base Vietnam and many other bumpy roads “in country”.

RED HORSE “can do” motto and attitude carried me through the rest of my military, civil service and civilian careers. But for a surgery at the VASFCM in 2010, I’d still be a “can do” guy.

Although I still have the memories, I lost most of my military stuff and photos over the years. Moreover, Vietnam was a brief blip, but memorable experience. I went on to become airman of the year 3640th Pilot Training Wing Laredo Texas, and moved on to the AFCS Eielson AFB AK where I lost 14 units of blood from a bleeding ulcer. They stopped the bleeding, and I was reassigned to AFCS Little Rock AFB. Two years later surgery to address my peptic ulcer issues resulted in a nicked and removed spleen after 5 hours under the knife.

Regardless, I will be happy to contribute, but do not remember the dates. Prior to deployment, I went through Combat Arms Training and Maintenance (CATM) at Hamilton. When I got to Saigon, 3 days at Hamilton felt inadequate. The 1st CEG Commander didn’t want to hear excuses why material or equipment were not available to the RED HORSE squadrons. Consequently, I was running more than sitting at a desk.

Thanks Wikipedia—we learn something new every day.

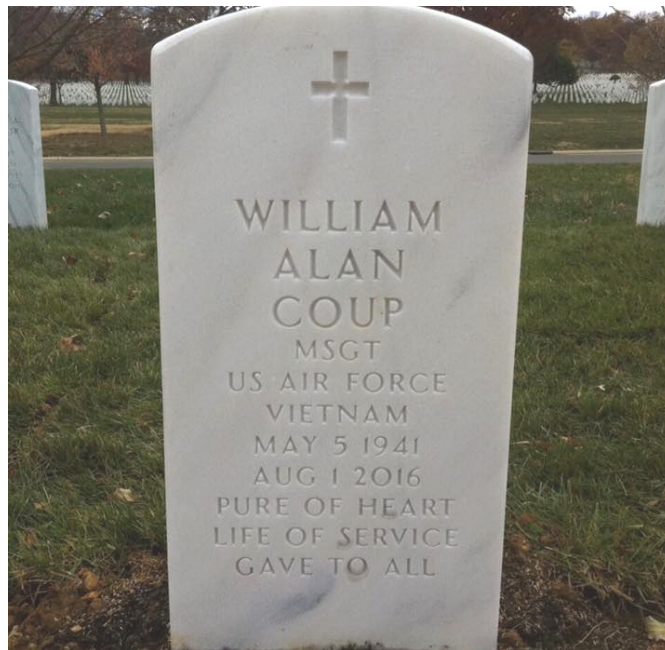


FROM THE EDITOR: To the left is Jerry Jenkins' "Career Board" as I call it.
